They join many graduates who continue to tell us that our courses offer practical training and experience, confirming that we are a provider dedicated solely to improving the mental health of the broader community.






About Cairnmillar

The Cairnmillar Institute is one of Australia's leading centres for psychology and counselling services and an industry leader in psychology education and training. Founded by Professor Emeritus Dr Francis Macnab in 1961, the Cairnmillar Institute pioneered counselling and psychotherapy in Australia.

Over this time, Cairnmillar has developed a unique mental health model – the 'Triple Helix' referred to as the three pillars of Cairnmillar. The three pillars of: training, research, and clinical practice are integrated through all programs and services, where each pillar reinforces and informs the other two, therefore strengthening and building our expertise in mental health.

As a registered higher education and accredited Vocational Educational and Training (VET) provider, we are focused on providing mental health training through a range of courses spanning from microcredentials and short courses to university-equivalent degrees (Bachelor of Psychology & Counselling through to Doctor of Psychology (Clinical Psychology).



For more than 60 years, Cairnmillar has been at the forefront of clinical psychology and psychotherapy services with a strong reputation for clinical excellence and community engagement. Our clinical and 'translational' research focuses on taking basic psychological theory and empirical findings and turning them into evaluated and applied outcomes that benefit the community.

As a not-for-profit organisation and a registered health promotion charity we seek to leverage our expertise and deliver real benefits to the communities we serve, including those in regional and rural areas. Our location and facilities

The Institute moved to our new location in Hawthorn East in 2018, where we offer our accredited higher education (university equivalent), VET & short courses, as well as clinical services to the community.

We are about 500 meters from Monash Freeway via the Toorak Road exit. Tooronga train station is also 400 meters away, and we are a short walk from major bus and tram routes. Many car park spaces are also available onsite for free.

Our lecture, tutorial and counselling rooms are fully equipped to meet student needs. All rooms are equipped with audio-visual facilities, overhead projectors and an internet connection. A video camera and recording facility is available to meet the educational needs of provisional psychologists and counselling and psychotherapy students.



Studying at Cairnmillar

The Faculty has developed an outstanding teaching program and a reputation for the training of psychologists, psychotherapists and counsellors. In 2022 our courses were ranked 6th and 8th on most quality Teaching and Learning metrics, out of a possible 93 universities and higher education institutions. Almost 87% of students are positive about their skill development, compared to the national average of 78.6%. Our psychology degrees have accreditation from the Australian Psychology Accreditation Council (APAC) as being equivalent in status to university degrees in psychology. Cairnmillar policies and regulations

Applying to study at Cairnmillar

Before applying to study with Cairnmillar

There are some steps to consider before applying to study with Cairnmillar.

Step #1: Have prior qualifications assessed by the APS (psychology only where relevant)

The APS assesses at what level of APAC accreditation your qualification(s) are comparable to.

Please note, this does not apply to applicants interested in our Counselling & Psychotherapy programs. Instead, you are encouraged to apply without APS assessment of overseas transcripts, ensuring they have been officially translated into English (where required).

APS assessments can take some time to complete during peak periods, so it is important to start this process as soon as possible, so it is ready in advance of the relevant applications period. You can find more information on the APS website.

Step #2: See which courses at CMI are available to International applicants

Note, any courses with CRICOS codes means they are available to international students.

Cairnmillar's CRICOS registered provider number is 03530E. Our listing can be found on the <u>Department of Education</u>, Skills and <u>Employment website</u>.

While some courses offer a part-time option, student visa holders are required to study full-time only. Please also consider visa requirements regarding online delivery. (See further details about visa applications and advice below.)

Step #3: Review the English Language requirements for each course(s)

Some recognised English tests include:

- International English Language Testing System (IELTS)
- Pearson/PTE Academic
- TOEFLIBT
- Occupational English Test (OET)





Helpful tip: Book your test well before the applications period begins. There can be long delays in booking a testing session. It also gives you the opportunity to re-take the test if your attempt was unsuccessful.

Step #4: Make yourself aware of any relevant policies.

Before arriving in Australia

There are conditions under which you may need, or not need a VISA:

Visa applications and advice

Under legislation, the Cairnmillar Institute is not allowed to provide advice about migration or visas. Only the Department of Home Affairs, a Registered Migration Agent or a Migration Lawyer are permitted to do so.

International students can find more information about applying for or extending student visas directly from the <u>Department of Home Affairs</u>.

If you have any further questions about your visa and your obligations as a student visa-holder you should contact a registered migration agent, a migration lawyer or other registered service. You can find a list of all registered migration agents and advisors at the Office of the Migration Agents Registration Authority. Please be aware that you will need to pay for any fees charged and the Cairnmillar Institute will not be entering into arrangements with any service provider or pay commission on your tuition for any education agents or other services. Cairnmillar does not pay commission for enrolments of international students under any circumstances.

Applicants not applying for a visa

Some applicants may already hold a visa which allows full or part-time study (e.g., permanent residency or a spousal visa).

If you are successful in being made an offer of study and indicate you will not be applying for a student visa on your offer acceptance and enrolment form, then you may need to consent to a VEVO check to confirm your eligibility to study in Australia for the duration of your program.

Note: Permanent residents and New Zealand citizens are considered domestic students for tuition fee purposes but will not normally be eligible for FEE-HELP. See: Fees & Scholarships.

Further requirements as a Cairnmillar student

Maintaining overseas student health cover (insurance)

It is a requirement of Australian Government that you and any dependents (e.g., spouses and children under 18 years) maintain Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) for the entire period of your student visa. You will be responsible for obtaining and maintaining appropriate OSHC.

Attending an admissions interview (if applicable)

Some of Cairnmillar's postgraduate courses require shortlisted applicants to attend an admissions interview, to assess their suitability for entry into the program.

To view entry requirements and see which programs conduct admissions interviews, see <u>Find a</u> Course.

If your application is shortlisted and you receive an email invitation, be aware that all interviews are conducted remotely (via Microsoft Teams or Zoom). Admissions interviews typically occur in November, December and January each year.

Please note, all interview times are provided in Melbourne time.

Following up an application

We understand that there are significant and strict deadlines associated with visa applications, but we are generally not able to provide exact dates of when an offer may arrive, exact positions on an offer waitlist, or inform you of whether you are likely to receive an offer or not.

We provide outcomes to students whether successful or unsuccessful as soon as a decision has been made regarding their application.

Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE)

A Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE) is for international students seeking a student visa and is the only accepted evidence of enrolment for processing these requests.

You will only be provided with a CoE after you have signed and returned an International Student Enrolment Agreement and paid for your first semester tuition fees.

Some disabilities may impact your career and registration obligations. Once you have become a student, our course coordinators are here to help with any questions you may have.

Mentoring and counselling

Current students have access to an experienced student mentor who can assist them with study skills, time management, academic progress, assistance with English language, and other academic issues. Individual counselling with a qualified clinician is also available for students experiencing difficulties in their personal life, or the stress and anxiety associated with academic study.

Career support and advice

Our course and program coordinators are more than happy to assist with any career guidance or planning questions you may have, as well as supporting further study applications when appropriate.





We also run career planning and preparation workshops during our Orientation week. Students from our Certificate IV in Career Development periodically run dedicated careers sessions as well.



Academic skills support

thedesk (online student support)

thedesk aims to support Australian tertiary students to achieve mental and physical health and wellbeing. Library

The library at Cairnmillar is a highly specialised library resource, aimed at the curriculum requirements of our students, psychological research and clinical psychology.

Our library focuses on the on the needs of our counselling, psychotherapy and psychology students and staff. It has an exceptional range of materials to support our curriculum, as well as some amazing books including the minutes of Freud's first psychology meeting in Vienna.

Just under half of our physical collection is available on the shelves, with the rest of the historical collection available on request. In addition to the books, journals and test library we also have a wide range of electronic resources, including psychology specific databases, journals and e-resources for students. The student placement collection is a highlight of the library and assists students while on placement to understand complex psychological issues with children, adolescents and the aged. An extensive collection of psychological tests are available to students to borrow from, at the approval of their supervisor.

Students and staff are able to meet with our librarians to gain research and informational assistance in all facets of their learning, research and clinical requirements. This includes individual sessions in developing literature searches relevant to their research proposal, as well as group sessions aimed at library and research skills.

It is important to note that <u>all tenants</u> in Victoria receive the same rights and obligations. The same rules apply for everyone, no matter their background or reason for renting.

Some additional factors to consider on top of rental costs include:





- The security bond, paid at the beginning and returned at the end of the lease depending on the upkeep of the property
- Furniture most rental properties will be unfurnished
- Utility costs (electricity, water, gas, internet).

Working in Australia

As an international student there are important compliance requirements you must be aware of to ensure you do not violate your visa obligations.

Once employed, you are covered by the same work laws as every other Australian (e.g., under law you must be paid the minimum wage per hour regardless of the job you do, unless there is a registered agreement from both parties about the pay rate; you will also get break times and follow the same health and safety laws, etc.).

A major consideration for students is to ensure that employment does not impair your ability to study and complete your degree. Nonetheless, there are several reasons why employment during your stay in Australia should be considered. These include (but are not limited to): (1) gaining experience and skills; (2) professional and social networking; (3) improving your CV; (4) demonstrating your ability for time management, teamwork and taking responsibility; and (5) improving your knowledge of Australian workplaces.

When seeking work with a potential employer, ensure you are at least clear about (1) employment status (e.g., part-time or casual work); (2) the expected hours per week (and starting and finishing times); (3) the pay rate (including penalty rates; see the Fairwork pay calculator link below); and (4) leave entitlements. Please note you will need to have a tax file number when starting paid employment (see link below).
